Evening with the Murals

HGAC will honor the late Virginia Jacobs McLaughlin, the artist who created the lovely murals that grace the walls at the G.A.R. hall, with a special "Evening with the Murals" program on Friday, November 3 at the hall, located on 53 E. Middle Street in Gettysburg.

Come spend some time viewing the murals up close, and meet members of McLaughlin's family, including son Saylor, who will speak about his mother's life as an artist.

Tickets for this event are free, but limited, due to the seating at the G.A.R. Hall. You can reserve tickets beginning on October 9 – only two per order – by emailing HGAC at histgettyac@aol.com. Please give your name and phone number for a follow-up confirmation.

Virginia Jacobs McLaughlin identified herself as an "itinerant painter" – those folk artists who historically traveled the countryside creating paintings and other works of art, not for monarchs and nobility, but for everyday people. The book of her collected works,

"Itinerant Painter, Virginia Jacobs McLaughlin: A Lifelong Brush With History," chronicles her 30-plus year career. When it was published in 2017, McLaughlin was nearing 95 years old and estimated she had painted about 116 murals.

McLaughlin was born in Columbia, Missouri and studied art at Stephens College and the University of Missouri, before moving to Washington D.C. and enrolling in the Abbott School for Commercial Art. She met her husband, Don, in Washington, and traveled with him on assignments to Europe and the Far East, before they settled in Fairfield, in Adams County. Don McLaughlin joined HGAC and eventually became the organization's president, and it was at his urging that Virginia undertook the mural project at the G.A.R. Hall. The cycle of murals reflects the inspiration of other artists, notably American itinerant painter Rufus Porter and the French wallpaper designer Jean Zuber. Her artwork can be found in many area structures, ranging from private homes to government buildings to the Potomac Room of Mount Vernon Inn.

Come help us celebrate the life and legacy of this "itinerant painter" who left Adams County a lasting gift on the walls of the G.A.R. hall.

President's message:

Giving Spree is once again upon us. We thank everyone who has contributed to HGAC on this day of giving in the past. Your donations last year helped fund the very successful Civil War Hospital Sign program with the students of the technology program at Gettysburg Area High School. Students create new hospital markers to replace those that are aging or in disrepair at Civil War Hospital sites in and around Gettysburg. This year HGAC is looking a bit closer to home – we hope to raise funds for the maintenance and upkeep of our headquarters, the G.A.R. Building at 53 E. Middle Street in Gettysburg. The Grand Army of the Republic (G.A.R.) Hall is an ongoing preservation effort that HGAC assumed when it acquired the hall in 1988. Recent expenses in the past year include the renovation of the upstairs bathroom and repair of the boiler. As the hall enters its third century, work is needed for both the exterior and interior of the building.

When donating through the Giving Spree, donors can choose to give to either Today funds – which go to the annual project – or to Forever funds, which goes to the HGAC endowment. The HGAC endowment is a simple and forever way for our members and supporters to contribute to the ongoing mission of HGAC. Today gifts will support immediate needs like the repairs to the G.A.R. Building; Forever gifts will support the continued growth of HGAC.

FOR THE BARNS!

There's a lot of truth to the old saying that "What you get out of something is what you put into it." The HGAC Historic Barns Tour of Gettysburg and Adams County proved that's true! Saturday, September 16 was a very good day for barns in Adams County. Owners of six barns and 62 volunteers generously donated hundreds of hours of their time to advance HGAC's mission of historic preservation.

It was a picture-perfect fall day for the HGAC Preservation Committee to welcome 321 participants to the 2023 Barn Tour. The event brought in \$17,000 before expenses. Proceeds from the Barn Tour benefit the HGAC Barn Preservation Project and Grant Program, providing funds to barn owners to make needed repairs.

The tour started at the **Historic Round Barn**. After checking in, and receiving their Barn Tour booklet and map, participants could then drive to the other five barns on the tour in any order and stay as long as they liked.

Barns on the Tour included:

- At the Starr Barn just south of Abbottstown, owners Tom and Dianne Starr welcomed visitors to their circa 1840 brick-end barn. The ground floor of the barn is home to the Starr Pottery studio and shop and the upper floor serves as the Starr's residence. During the tour Mary Moores operated a potter's wheel and Tom Starr explained early brick-making methods.
- At beautiful **Beech Springs Farm**, owners Jayne and Bill Shord welcomed members of the Foothills Artists inside the barn while Mountain Valley Plein Air Painters created artworks outdoors. Musicians John and Sharon Knowles, Dave Matsinko and Tom Fontana performed outdoors in Beech Springs' gardens. The Susquehanna Travellers provided Civil War era music to accompany dancers in period attire led by Norma Calhoun.
- Built in the 1830's, the **Sarah Patterson Barn** served as a field hospital during the Battle of Gettysburg. On the barn's threshing floor, members of the Historic Barn and Farm Foundation of Pennsylvania presented information about their preservation efforts across the state. Under the forebay, Civil War living history presenter Eddie Roberts described life in the mid-1800's.
- The beautifully restored **Cornerstone Barn** is home to 7 Sky Farm, a veteran-owned and operated beef cattle farm. Visitors enjoyed meeting the farm's horses and cattle. There was live music in the barn and fresh apples for everyone from Rice Fruit Company.
- The **Stone of Scone Barn** was built in the 1820s and underwent a full-scale restoration in 2016 by the current owners Bob Rodgers and Patricia Green Rodgers. This barn featured a timber framing demonstration by Lee Sornson, Peter Bugler, Doug Keefer, Steve Glassman and David Maclay, as well as apple cider pressing and tasting offered by Ben Wenk, owner of Ploughman Farm Cider. Artist bobbi becker, members of the Panera Tatters and expert wood carver, Frank Rauscher, displayed their art in the lower level.

Heartfelt thanks go out to Barn Tour event sponsors, barn owners, musicians, artists, presenters and the many volunteers who staffed each barn that made the day a resounding success, as both a friend raiser and a fund raiser for HGAC's mission of historic preservation.

Mark your calendar for the 2024 Historic Barns Tour to be held rain or shine on Saturday, September 21, 2024 – always the third Saturday of September.

HGAC Youth Initiative programs hone students' preservation skills

School is back in session and that means Historic Gettysburg Adams County volunteers are starting a new round of workshops and programs for high school students designed to foster interest in historic preservation and restoration work.

Students from the Gettysburg Area High School's Technology program will be manufacturing new signs to mark Civil War hospital sites, and building trades students from the Adams County Technical Institute (ACTI) will take part in HGAC's annual timber framing Learning Lab. Both programs are key components of HGAC's Investing in Youth Initiative, formed in 2019 to encourage a general appreciation among our youth for Adams County's heritage and history.

The hands-on Learning Lab for ACTI students will be held Wednesday, October 11 at the battlefield's historic George Spangler Barn, with help from HGAC's participating partners, the Gettysburg Foundation and the National Preservation Training Center of Frederick, Md. This is the fifth learning lab sponsored by HGAC. Dave Snyder is the ACTI Building Trades instructor and David Maclay, HGAC Barn Preservation Specialist, oversees the instructional program.

At the lab, skilled artisans instruct the students in timber framing, stone masonry, hand hewing, peg making and other skills used in preserving historic buildings. Students work with these artisans during the daylong session to build a "bent," a basic structural cross-section of a timber framed structure. A representative from the National Preservation Training Center – the National Park Service's premier historical preservation and restoration organization – will also address the students on job opportunities in the preservation field.

Over at Gettysburg Area High School, Technology Education instructor Stan Licharowicz supervises his class as they manufacture another batch of signs to replace aging markers for Civil War hospital sites. The students use the latest computer-aided design and laser manufacturing technologies to produce these weather-resistant, long-lasting signs. The signs are then installed by HGAC volunteers.

During the past two school years, students have manufactured 14 replacement signs, 13 for sites under private ownership and one for the National Park Service. This year, the technology class will be working on nine replacement signs for the NPS. This year's students were very proactive and reached out to HGAC to identify which signs were to be fabricated next.



The nine NPS signs will include these farms used as hospitals: Lydia Leister, Jacob Hummelbaugh, William Patterson, Michael Frey, George Spangler, Edward McPherson, Henry Culp, Josiah Benner and Samuel Cobean.

HGAC first posted roadside Civil War hospital signs in 1983. The original signs were updated in 2001 and now are once again showing their age. The partnership with the GAHS technology program was supported by the 2022 Giving Spree drive, and HGAC thanks the students for continuing a job well done!

We will be selling Mamie Eisenhower's famous fudge again for the market. Please email or call for the recipe if you wish to make some for the market.


