girl, living on a 1926 Elco Cruiser in New Jersey, and how my grandparents lived on a farm that had been passed down from generation to generation. The classic yacht and historic family farm shaped my future and how I wanted to live my life and hopefully guide my young family's future as well. The family farm was at first what seemed to have the most influence. My interest in barns, and their historic presence in our Adams County landscape, was definitely shaped by my experiences and memories of the family farm in NJ.

Deeply entrenched in my role as advocate for historic preservation in Adams County, I thought I knew where I was headed, but as life often does, mine took a turn. I suddenly found myself remembering my life growing up on that 1926 Elco and traveling the waterways North/East to Maine and back. My "Expedition" partner and I visiting boatyards on the NJ and Long Island Shore and checking out every older wooden boat we could find. Especially the NJ built ones. Those are our favorites, having grown up with them right under our noses on the Jersey Shore. We talk about construction, the influences of the boat-maker and what made each wooden boat unique and different from the other.

I started to think about how my upbringing has influenced my preference and appreciation for historic, classic and well-built homes, barns and boats alike.

I realize that in this day and age, an appreciation of historic building techniques is fast losing ground. In the eyes of the HGAC Board, providing a future for Adams County by establishing our Youth in Education Program, our Barn Grant Program, our Historic House Awards, and our NEW HGAC Endowment Fund, will help historic preservation hold its ground here in Adams County.







Book showcases African American and Dutch influence on count



A new book by historian James Fritz showcases early African American and Dutch settlers in Adams County through a study of the area's historic buildings.

The 309-page book is the third in Fritz's "Historic Architecture of Adams County, Pennsylvania" series. The collection tells the stories of early settlers and villages of Adams County using historic maps, photos and documents.



Rather than just include the latest list of awardee homes, I met with the board to create a flagship publication for HGAC," he said.

The project grew into a passion for Fritz.

"Well over 100 dwellings and structures had to be photographed and described," he said. "I wanted to give the public a publication that had a regional appeal to include York and some of Lancaster County's history. In prints, pictures and deep history the reader can begin to learn about the earliest settlers to Adams County."

The books combine coffee table presentation with carefully cited sources that will appeal to casual readersand historians alike, he said.

His most recent volume delves into both ethnic and religious history to tell the story of African American and Dutch settlers in Adams County and northern Maryland.

The contributions and history of African Americans "have remained unheralded in many ways," Fritz says.

Struggling to gain equality and recognition, they contributed within a white European world in the best way they could through acquisition of land, working in occupations where they were accepted and serving in the United States military," he said. "Heroism on the battlefield is one thing, but the daily struggle for a place in a society where slavery once existed is quite another matter."

Fritz also explores the history of Dutch immigrants to Adams County, members of the Dutch Reformed Church, who came from New Jersey to Adams and York counties.

"In prints of landscapes and native dress from the time period, one can gain a sense of how the newcomers may have appeared," he said. "To be sure, they differed in language, culture, religion and politics from the many Scots-Irish and German community members who were already farming in Adams County."

The book features the architecture and history of the western part of the county, including Hunterstown, Cashtown, Fairfield, McKnightstown and Orrtanna. The foreword is written by Bonnie Braun, who, along with her husband Bill, purchased and restored the historic Eiker Farm in Liberty Township.

As with all of the books in the collection, Fritz says he hopes people are inspired to dig deeper after reading.

"I hope they will take away a sense of their history and its importance in the American colonies before and after the American Revolution," he said. "I believe the publication will most certainly stimulate their interest for further study and research."

Upcoming books in the series cover themes of economic growth in Adams County in the 19th century and the historic preservation movement.

HGAC Provides Barn Preservation Grants to 11 Barns in 2020



Every year, the HGAC Barn Preservation Project and Grant Program makes grants available to owners of historic barns within Adams County. This year, a record setting number of 11 barn owners were able to take advantage of this unique program that helps to extend the life of historic barns and to preserve the rural character of Adams County. The maximum grant amount is \$2500 which must be matched by the barn owner's labor or a cash outlay of that amount for materials or contract labor.

One of the goals of HGAC is to help fund as many barn preservation projects as possible and to help barns owners by providing technical advice and recommendations. All projects are reviewed using ten criteria contained in the grant guidelines including the visibility of the

barn to the general public, the age of the barn, the need for immediate repairs and whether the work will help maintain the historic character of the barn. There are often a host of maintenance and preservation issues that barn owners are faced with, and HGAC's grants encourage taking on one project at a time rather than throwing in the towel and demolishing the barn. The work being funded in 2020 includes roof replacement on three barns, roof coating, replacing gutters, replacing sills, post and piers, gable wall restoration, rebuilding a gable wall, replacing doors, repairing foundation masonry and replacing a barn ramp retaining wall.

Curt Musselman, Executive Director of the HGAC Barn Preservation Project, notes that this is the largest number of grants to preserve barns on the HGAC Barn Register since grants were first provided by HGAC in 2013. Our success is thanks to the generosity of our Barn Preservation Project sponsors including the Rice Fruit Company, the Knouse Foods Corporation, the ACNB Bank, the South Mountain Partnership, Beech Springs Farm, Future Stake Inc., the Gettysburg Times, Destination Gettysburg, Sherwin Williams and all of the other individuals who made donations to the John and Mary Horner Fund for Barn Preservation.

One thing that all of our donors have in common is that they value the contribution that these iconic structures make to our historic and largely rural communities. Many of these solidly built barns continue to serve the agriculture industry even though they may be fulfilling a different role than they were originally intended to carry out. Historic barns no longer used in agriculture still help to preserve the agricultural settings and historic landscapes that are so important to the tourism industry and to preserving the rural character of Adams County. If you own a barn and want to be considered for a barn preservation grant in 2021, applications are now being accepted for consideration until March 1, 2021. Grants are only awarded to historic barns that are within Adams County and that are listed on the HGAC Barn Register. At the present time, the Register includes over 350 barns, which is about 24 percent of the historic barns in the county. Barns are added to the Register by HGAC, at the request of the barn owners. Inclusion in the Register provides recognition of the barn and the opportunity to participate in the HGAC grant program, but inclusion does not legally bind the owner in any way whatsoever.

It is expected that the grant money to be disbursed by HGAC in 2021 will help with the stabilization and repair of at least six more historic barns. Once again this year, additional funds are available to HGAC to be specifically awarded to barns in the Adams County Fruit Belt. Only two of the eleven barns receiving grant awards in 2020 were from within that region of the county.

There is no application fee to apply for the grant if the barn owner is an HGAC member. If an applicant is not an HGAC member for the year 2021, their application must include a check for \$25 to become a member of HGAC for the year. Application guidelines and the application itself are available on-line at www.hgaconline.org. Click on the word "Programs" at the top of the page and then place your cursor over the words "Barn Preservation Project" so that a list appears that includes the words "Barn Grants". Now click on the words "Barn Grants" in order to reveal the link to the grant guidelines and application. 

BUTTONS for BARNS: What Did You Do During the Lockdown?

Even the dark cloud of Covid has a silver lining. Back in March during the pandemic lockdown I began making buttons... again. I first started making buttons during the run-up to the 150th battle anniversary seven years ago. Longtime HGAC member, Bruce Kile, mentioned to me that country folks used to make buttons from the American Sycamore tree (AKA "Buttonwood Tree").

Along Baltimore Street in Gettysburg, there happens to be a massive American Sycamore tree. This tree was a "witness" to the great battle and to Lincoln's procession to the cemetery where he delivered the Gettysburg Address. Picking up fallen branches from this living "witness tree," and using them to make buttons, I gave sets of buttons as gifts to friends.

Fast forward to July, 2020. An old friend of ours owns an online business called "The French Needle," offering supplies and accessories from around the world for fine needlecraft... including buttons! A few days after sending samples of witness tree buttons to the French Needle, we were surprised and thrilled to see that the buttons were posted for sale, along with this message: "100% of the purchase price will go to the Historic Gettysburg-Adams County Preservation Society's Barn Preservation Project." Button sales were brisk, and thanks to some great ideas from Walter and Jeannette Smith, my production process improved greatly!

What is the difference between a today gift and a forever gift?

On the Donation Form, you'll see that for each nonprofit you choose to make a gift to, you can check either the Today column or the Forever column. If you check Today, your gift will go to the nonprofit right away, to help with immediate needs. If you check Forever, your gift will be added to a permanent endowment fund held at the Community Foundation. Each year a grant will be made from that fund to the nonprofit, sustaining it for years and decades to come.



What can I give?

You can give by check or credit card using the Donation Form attached here.

You can also transfer stock, make a charitable rollover gift from your IRA, or recommend a grant from your donor-advised fund at the Community Foundation or another institution. See <u>ACCFGivingSpree.org</u> for more information on these types of gifts.



Are donations tax deductible?

Yes, donations are tax deductible as allowed by law. The charitable status of each nonprofit has been verified by the Adams County Community Foundation. The Community Foundation will send you an acknowledgement, which will serve as your tax receipt, for the total amount of your gift. The Community Foundation will send your gift to the nonprofit(s) you selected, which may send you an informal thank-you.



What is the **Stretch Pool** and can I donate to it?

Yes you can! Your gift to the "Stretch Pool" (#99 on the list) will help all of the participating nonprofits. At the close of the Giving Spree, the Stretch Pool is distributed to all of the participating nonprofits in proportion to the amount they raised during the Giving Spree.
